Progress of Haiti Shows In Commissioner's Report

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti, (AP)—Haiti, rich soil in and agricultural resources, has just completed one of the best fiscal years of its history.
A study of the 1924-1925 financial report shows that \$8,097,533 in revenue was received by the republic, as compared to \$6,550,424 the previous year. This surpassed by \$1,298,948 the total receipts of 1919-1920, the best previous year since the American intervention.
Expenditures totaled \$7,843,649 approximately a million more than in 1923-1924. Half of this increase, however, was devoted to retiring debts, while the remainder was allotted to public works and agriculture.
