FORMER G. O. P. FIGURE DIES

HYDE PARK, Vt. (By the Associated Press) — Former United States Senator Carroll S. Page, a prominent figure in Vermont politics, died last night. He was the oldest member in the senate in point of years although not of service during his incumbency. Born January 19, 1842, he was the son of a prominent senator in age.

In Vermont's history, Senator Page was a prominent figure. For more than half a century he had given of his time and talents to public service, his state and the nation. He served both in the state and national legislatures, as governor of Vermont from 1890 to 1892, and was a stalwart among republican leaders produced by New England, having occupied many positions of trust and responsibility.

In his home state, Senator Page was referred to as "the storm petrel of Vermont politics." His home was at Hyde Park and the show place of the neighborhood.

GRAIN LOAN LOSS LESS

SALEM, Ore. — Prospective losses to the state resulting from loans to farmers in the frost-devastated areas of eastern Oregon under a law enacted at the last session of the legislature probably will not exceed \$2000 or \$3000, according to figures compiled here today by James S. Stewart, third representative of the state board of control. It was reported that the losses might exceed \$10,000.

On January 1 of next year approximately \$12,000 of the aggregate loans will remain unpaid, Mr. Stewart said. Of this amount he estimated that \$3000 would be paid off following next year's harvest. Interest returns to the state will take care of \$2000 of the estimated loss, which would reduce the net loss to \$2000.

At present there remains unpaid only \$49,262.20 of the \$296,431.25 net. Loans unpaid include five in Sherman county, 12 in Gilliam county and 47 in Morrow county.
