 JACK DEMPSEY**

LOS ANGELES (NPA Special)—Now Jack Dempsey is tired of society, art, small talk and cosmetics. He yearns for thudding leather—for red blood.
 "In the future my place is going to be in the ring," declares the heavyweight champion. "I wasn't cut out to be an actor. I'm not cultured enough, or something, I guess. To be a success as an actor, a man must be educated, read books and things like that."
 "That lets me out. I don't care for that stuff. My interest is in athletics. I'd much rather sock some guy on the jaw than sit down and read one of the so-called high-brow books." Dempsey's own words. "The fight racket is mine. I feel at home when I climb through the ropes."
 "One member of the family in the movies is enough anyway. I'm going to let my wife take care of that end. I never did care for the movies but it was a lot of fun to clown around. The main thing though, was that they paid me and paid plenty. Where the money is, that's where I am."
 Dempsey says he is in earnest about going through with his fight with Harry Wills next summer. He is out of condition now but goes through daily workouts at his gymnasium here.
 "Jack is beginning to think he has been wrong in not fighting. Now he is ready to climb into the squared circle against anybody. My first match must be with Wills," says the champion. "After that I'll be ready to take on all comers—providing, of course, we can draw a big enough gate to make it worth while."
 In his heart, Dempsey is a fighter. But first he is after money. He admits it.

TRICK KICK.
 When is a field goal not a field goal?
 A revival of a rather unusual play by a football fan prompts that question.

It seems that in a certain college game played this fall one of the teams attempted a drop kick from the 25-yard line. A strong wind was blowing against the kicker at the time.
 The player got away a well executed drop kick that had plenty of power back of it. It carried directly between the goal posts. The supporters of the team sitting on a line with the posts let out a wild cheer as the ball was seen to pass through and beyond the posts.
 The drop kick, according to my informant, was the deciding factor in the game. Neither team had scored and allowing the goal practically meant victory to the kicking team.

As the ball carried over the line the capers of the strong wind created a situation that caused a lengthy protest and near forfeit.

BREAK OF WIND.
 While it was apparent to many of the spectators sitting at the proper angle that the ball had crossed the goal line, the wind upset everything, including the officials.

After the ball had passed over the line the strong wind carried it back in the field of play and the ball dropped in front of the goal posts on about the three-yard line.
 At first two of the officials held out for the allowing of the goal, but they were finally won over to the remaining two, who insisted the goal did not count.

The dispute of course hinges on just when the play is completed. Those who favor the allowing of the field goal could cite the rule which says a touchdown results when the ball is over, on, or across the goal line.

Those who insist the drop kick was not legal could cite the fact that the play is not completed until the ball strikes the ground after going over the crossbar.

I am inclined to take the viewpoint. It strikes me as the more logical, for the completion of the play really must be judged as to where the ball finally settles.

In this play it settled on playing territory, even though at one time in its flight it had passed over the goal line.
