## Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)  
Breakfast—Stewed prunes, cereal, top milk, broiled bacon, creamed potatoes, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.  
Luncheon—Salmon timbales, canned peas, in butter, graham bread, celery hearts, grape tapoca pudding, milk, tea.  
Dinner—Roasted Chicken, giblet gravy, mashed potatoes, creamed onions, cabbage-celery-pepper salad, pumpkin pie, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

With the exception of the chicken and perhaps the pie this dinner menu is made up of foods that are inexpensive. If one must watch her food budget closely this is one of the easiest ways to make a "great" possible occasionally. If the meat is high in price choose cheap vegetables. Even the pickled onion is delicious if carefully prepared and served.

**Grape Tapoca Pudding**  
Two cups grape juice, 4 tablespoons cooking tapoca, 1 1/2 cups lemon juice, 3/4 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 egg white.  
Pour 1 cup of cold water over tapoca and let stand while scalding grape juice. Pour hot juice over tapoca and cook over hot water, stirring constantly until transparent. Add lemon juice, sugar and salt. Beat white of egg until stiff and dry and fold into tapoca mixture. Turn into a mold, chill and serve with a custard sauce made with yolk of the egg.
