## Elgin Couple Married Here

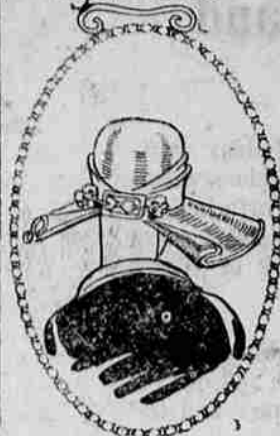

(By Sister Mary)  
Breakfast—Chilled apple sauce, eggs poached in milk on granau toast, fried hominy, syrup, milk coffee.  
Luncheon—Hamkins or macaroni and oysters, brown bread, carrot salad, vanilla wafers, milk, tea.  
Dinner—Noodle soup, pan-broiled pork chops, baked potatoes, corn custard, stuffed pear salad, Boston cream pie, bran rolls, milk, coffee.  
Keep in mind the necessity of cooking pork until well done. At the same time care must be taken not to dry the meat to chippiness. Sear the chops quickly on both sides and then cook slowly until tender, turning frequently. Season with salt and pepper five minutes before serving.
