Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)
Breakfast—Grapefruit, broiled bacon scrambled eggs with rice, graham muffins, milk, coffee.
Luncheon—Cream of spinach soup with spinach balls, crisp hot buttered toast, apple tapioca pudding, milk, tea.
Dinner—Roast beef, ham baked in milk, twice baked potatoes, beet salad, peach Bavarian cream, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.
The rice and muffins in the breakfast menu make up for the omission of a cereal.

The luncheon menu is very substantial and with crisp toast makes another dish quite unnecessary.
Dessert Salad
One and one-half cups diced cooked beets, 1/2 cup diced celery, 4 tablespoons chopped English walnut meats, French dressing, crisp lettuce, tablespoons mayonnaise (optional).

Combine beets and celery, sprinkle with French dressing and let stand on ice for 20 minutes. Arrange on crisp lettuce leaves. Sprinkle with nuts and top each salad with a spoonful of mayonnaise.

Peanuts can be used in place of walnuts if preferred.
The French dressing should be seasoned with salt and pepper with a suspicion of onion. Sugar and mustard are not good with the beets. Rub the salad bowl with a cut onion or use 1 drop of onion juice in the dressing.
