L. A. Chinatown To Give Way to New Buildings

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Los Angeles' Chinatown, a celebrated Plaza, rich in colorful history of the early days, are facing destruction as the hand of progress moves onward.

The two are within the forty blocks where \$50,000,000 will be spent on a civic center and union railroad terminal, the plans for which call for demolition of virtually all buildings now standing and reconstruction so as to conform to an architectural design.

It was on the Plaza that the Mexican governor, Felipe De Neve, founded "El Pueblo De Nuestra Señora De Reyna Le Los Angeles," September 4, 1781. It was the scene of the marriage of Pio Pico, California's famous Mexican governor.

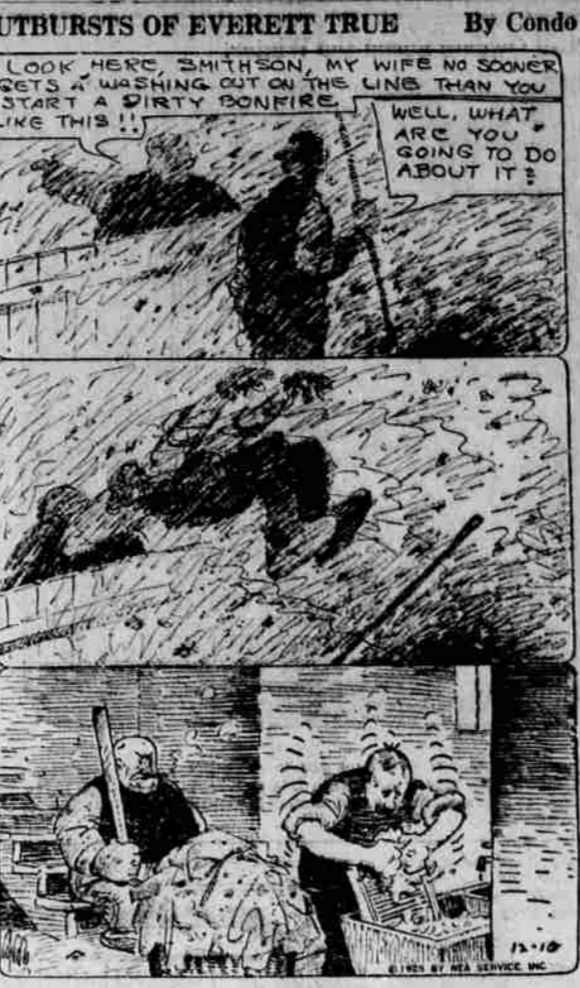
Here it was that the official document was read making Los Angeles instead of Monterey, the capital of the state. In 1849 a road-weary courier shouted from the Plaza that gold had been discovered in Northern California.

Two days later, the dusty throat of California was choked with tourists and old men sat silently puffing at long-stemmed pipes.

Life about the Plaza has not always been happy. Eighteen Chinese were hanged here in 1871 during a race uprising.

Chinatown, adjoining the Plaza, contains Ferguson's Alley, Apablasa and Marchessault streets, where young Chinese trade with tourists and old men sit silently puffing at long-stemmed pipes.

Ten years will be required to complete the reconstruction program, but already demands are being made to save the plaza. It appears certain, however, that the old tunnels and underground chambers, to which the Chinese and tourists find at any suspicion of recurrence of the massacre of 1871, must surrender to steam shovels the secrets they have hoarded for decades.

PROPERTY ISSUE LOSES

BAKER, Ore.—Decision of the Oregon supreme court affirming the legality on non-taxpayers' votes in a school bond election, received means that construction of a \$40,000 building for the Union high school, district No. 1, of Halfway, in Baker county, will proceed as planned.

The suit questioned the right of non-taxpayers to cast ballots on a bond issue. Judges of the election held that such votes were illegal. The bond issue was held up by action begun by several taxpayers of Halfway. C. T. Massey of Halfway and the firm of Teal, Minor & Winfree of Portland represented the school district and Nicholas, Hallock & McDonald of Baker, the protesting taxpayers.
