Officers of the company and United States mine inspectors have announced that rescue work will be continued until all bodies are recovered, and that all gas will be drawn from the shafts before any attempt is made to resume operations.

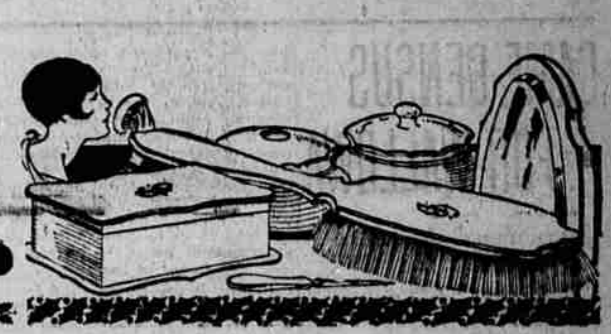
