Miscellaneous Wild Animals

Other wild animals in county: 100 leopards scattered along streams in various parts of the county; 150 martins; 225 mice; 225 weasels; 225 foxes found in the high mountains at the headwaters of the various creeks; 2500 coyotes; 150 bobcats. It is estimated that 750 coyotes were killed by local hunters, not including the government hunters whose reports for the year are incomplete, and 20 bobcats were killed.

GAME CENSUS FOR WALLOWA

INTERMEDIATE (Special)—Reports compiled by Supervisor S. J. Billings of the Wallowa National forest give estimates covering wild animal life in the county which will be of value at the conference of sportsmen with Game Warden E. F. Averill to be held next week. Mr. Averill is on a tour of the state for the purpose of meeting hunters and fishers and learning their wishes as to new regulations by the state game commission. A new law specifically empowers the commission to issue various regulations, with the state authority as if enacted by the legislature.

have been gathered from rangers familiar with all parts of the forest and give the estimates of the various field men as to the number of game animals. Of course there can be nothing of the nature of a count or actual census, but the results represent the best efforts of men well informed and of ample experience. All the wild life in the county, except for certain varieties of birds, are to be found within the outer boundaries of the forest.

Count of Deer

Figures in this census show that there are 4200 mule deer in county, half of them east of the Tumbler river; 200 killed this year by hunters and 200 young deer killed by predatory animals, chiefly coyotes. The total count Mr. Billings thinks may be a little high, but the number is increasing. With a fair limit of one deer to each hunter, and with continued and more effective warfare on coyotes, the number of deer should amount to more than 5000, which the forests could carry without embarrassment to farmers and others. This would make good hunting for many sportsmen and the game would become a considerable asset to the county.

Elk: 600 in county, about 450 in the Big Meadows district, 100 between Bear Creek and the Mountain river, and 100 on the Little Salmon river in the northern part of the county. These elk are chiefly survivors of the wild lands that covered the county in early days. The elk are increasing and the county would carry from 2000 to 2500 under protection, similar to that afforded for the deer.

Mountain sheep: 45 animals. In the high mountains the only specimens in Oregon. Several seen, their numbers must be uncertain.

Bears: 220 in the county, most numerous on Bear creek and the Little Salmon; 32 bear were killed by hunters this year.

Many Game Birds
In the county are found nine species of game birds, a large number, with only a few western birds lacking.

Native pheasants or ruffed grouse—only in county; 225 killed by hunters and 2700 killed by predatory animals and birds.
Blue grouse—20,000 in county, half east of the Tumbler river; 1400 killed by hunters and 7200 killed

by other animals.
Franklin grouse or "foot hen"—125 in county; 40 killed by other animals.

Valley quail—4500 in county; 1500 killed by animals.

Mountain quail—1500 in county; 750 killed by animals.

Bob White quail—2200 in county; 1100 killed by animals.

Hudsonian pheasants—18,000 in county, the descendants of a few cranes of these birds brought in and released in 1912; 1000 killed by other animals.

The chief enemies of these game birds are skunks and hawks. If their depredations could be curbed the county would be alive with wild fowl. Hunters are a small factor in the life of the birds. The count does not take into consideration the Chinese pheasants, which live in the valley and do not roam into the forests. The number of these birds can be increased indefinitely with the help of man, for they can be hatched and reared as
