Ersine Gives Answer To Time Sales Criticism

In answer to the criticism of automobile time sales, A. R. Ersine, president of the Studebaker Corporation of America, says: "Without desiring to justify the abuse of credit, the automobile industry must vigorously use and defend it against unwarranted attack.

"The whole business structure of the nation and our present standard of living are supported by credit, and principally by consumer credit.

"Credit to consumers and time payments are made operative by our finance companies, re-arranging through our banks and trust companies, which normally supply commercial credits. Combined, these financial institutions comprise the greatest banking system ever created, and supply machinery for the conduct of business and credit which is a marvel of efficiency and effectiveness.

"Manufacturers, merchants and financiers fully realize today, as never before, that the wheels of business cannot be kept turning on a broad scale, without mass consumption.

"That credit must be available to consumers as well as to producers and distributors of the products of industry and agriculture. Mass consumption is necessary to support mass production and high wages, and mass credit is the Atlas which holds up all of them.

Star Shows Western Wonder—White Outlaw

Delightful Romance Colors Kyne Story at Sherrys

Unusually full of thrills and beautiful Western scenery, was the verdict of spectators at the opening of "The White Outlaw," a Universal Blue Streak Western, now showing at the Star Theatre.

This is the most impressive Western picture that citizens of La Grande have been privileged to see for many months. That Cliff Smith, the director of the picture found the marvelous locale is another feat as wonderful as the directing of the wild horses.

The location of the action was placed in a sun-burnt plain enclosed by snow-capped mountains, one of the most beautiful contrasts ever filmed in a motion picture.

Jack Hoxie, as leading man, does some especially hazardous stunts to bring about the rescue of Marceline Day, his leading lady, from under the hoofs of a stampeding herd of a thousand wild horses. Miss Day is splendid in her role, imparting to the picture the vivacity and delicate fragrance of her youth, as a contrast to the rough, rugged heroism and the Tooley Stouman setting.

Scout Hoxie's favorite mount, has an important part in the picture, playing the leader of the wild horse herd. He is a natural actor.

The story is impressive and exciting enough to keep the spectators thrilled, but the most outstanding feature of the picture is the tremendous magnificence of the mountain scenes with the record daily valley below and the charging herd stampeding down the valley. The frightened rush of the animals is shown as photographed from the mountain top, and from close-ups on the floor of the valley.

This is a picture that no one should miss. It will be at the Star Theatre today and Sunday.

Through there are some who will argue that the Cinderella type or story is not true to life, there are none who will deny that stories of this sort are always delightful to hear, and that, occasionally, reality is stranger than fiction. Thus if after seeing "Beauty and the Bad Man" at Sherrys you feel that it is a bit too fairy-tale like to be true to life, consider that this makes it no less entertaining, but rather much more so. After the huge dose of sordid thrills which producers have been pouring down the throats of audiences it is rather refreshing to find a picture that deviates from the every day occurrences, and makes the unusual its theme.

"Beauty and the Bad Man" with Mabel Ballin and Correll Blanton, is the story of a fulfilled ambition, the path to which is by no means rose strewn. "Cornflower Cassie" is a pretty young girl with a voice like a nightingale, who leaves the unhappy home of her aunt to marry the church organist, lately arrived in town, because she believes he will help her with her career.

A few hours after her marriage, delirious and miserably she leaves the cheap boarding home to which her husband has taken her, and goes to a small mining town in answer to an ad for a model ballerina. Once there, she finds the place an ordinary saloon, and her disappointment is bitter. Modoc Hill, standing the crowd drinks in celebration of having just won thirty thousand dollars at faro, is attracted by the pathetic little figure, and urges her to sing.

Now some people called him a

bad man, but in life's greatest game he staked his all on the turn of a card to help a woman. On the dice impulse, awakened by the beautiful voice, Modoc Hill offers the bulk of his winnings to Cassie that she might go ahead and make good the wonderful gift nature had bestowed upon her.

Three years later, during which time Hill had served a jail sentence for the killing of a worthless gambler, Cassie returns to that little mining town, a brilliant success to find that Hill had not only won her admiration but had captured her heart as well.
