Dinner—Tomato soup, toast sticks, cheese souffle, creamed potatoes, spinach, rye bread, sponge cake, fruit jelly with whipped cream, milk, coffee.

The soup planned for this menu was made with a strong beef stock strained and cleared and strained tomato juice. Cheese souffle takes the place of meat. No salad is included since spinach is served as the second vegetable.

Creamed Rice on Toast. One cup hot cooked rice, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 1/2 cups milk, 2

tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup finely chopped cold-boiled or baked ham, 4 squares of hot toast.

Melt butter, stir in flour and slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Season with salt and pepper and cook five minutes after boiling begins. Arrange toast on a hot platter. Put a layer of ham on each piece of toast; cover with a layer of rice and pour over the cream sauce. Garnish with parsley and serve at once.
