BRUCE DENNIS OUTLINES PLANS OF ASSOCIATION

Today, before the chamber of commerce, President Dennis of the Harding Memorial association, briefly outlined the plans of the body and told on the meeting at Pendleton yesterday.

"There was a committee at the meeting a year ago to go on with the work until this territory has the federal memorial park it is seeking," Mr. Dennis said.

"I feel that it is a great thing for Eastern Oregon and especially for La Grande," he pointed out. "The two elements to take into consideration first, the sentimental and patriotic side and secondly, the commercial aspect. Situated practically at La Grande's front door, such a park would be a great advantage to this city."

He stated that all concerned get behind the movement and write to congressmen and senators, urging that the memorial business be carried. He indicated that the problem is one that will take a concentrated effort by a great number of people before it can be satisfactorily solved and before congress will feel sure that adoption of the plan is for the best.

Amateurs Usually Caught

Some few cases, the shopkeepers say, may happen in that way, but not many. For the amateur is almost certain to be caught, and of the shoplifters who have been apprehended this season, nearly every one was a figure familiar in the little group of persons who have to be watched.

La Grande merchants keep a systematic tab on all persons known to be light-fingered. As soon as a member of that uncertain gentry enters a store, he is spotted and watched until the doors close behind him. If he appears to be bound on shoplifting, warning is dispatched to other shops that he might visit.
