## Clubwomen Study American Artists

American artists furnished the inspiration for an afternoon of profitable study when members of the Neighborhood club met in general session at the library building Friday.

Mrs. L. L. Douglass, who was leader of the program, introduced the subject of American painting with a paper in which she mentioned prominent artists and told how they developed their styles and what they owed to the influence of European masters.

Two piano duets, "Prelude" by Gade, and "Hungarian Dance" by Brahms, were played by Mrs. E. L. Holmes and Miss Gladys Miller in the interlude preceding the remaining art talks.

The life of George Innes was sketched by Mrs. George Hines, who urged the club members to observe the work of George Innes Jr., of whom it is prophesied that he may surpass the attainments of his father.

A coincidence in the histories of the elder Innes and John Singer Sargent, whose biography was presented by Mrs. B. J. Eakin, occurred in their span of years, which in both cases numbered 69.

Sargent, who is acclaimed America's greatest portrait painter, was in reality born in Florence, Italy. Mrs. Eakin told the club, and although his parents were Americans, he never saw this country until he was 29 years old. Sargent's pictures after his death last summer reached the million dollar mark on the second day.

Works of the two painters were flashed on a screen for study during the two talks. Mrs. E. P. Mossman having charge of the stereopticon.

At a brief business session preceding the program, Mrs. C. H. Seranton, president, called attention of the club to La Grande's prominence in the latest edition of the Federation News, official organ of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs.
