Trace Silent Struggle for Existence Made by Pumpkin  
KANSAS CITY (AP)—The silent struggle for existence and the lengths to which a thirty-foot or pumpkin may go are made known by Prof. J. E. Weaver and Dr. Herbert C. Hanson, who have concluded intimate inquiry at Lincoln, Neb., into the private lives of those and other vegetables.

They propose to make their findings public before the American Association for the Advancement of Science here, Dec. 28-30.  
Plants such as beets, carrots, parsnips and turnips frequently send their roots down ten feet, their scientists have discovered. The roots of pumpkins and squashes, often growing at the rate of 2 to 2.5 inches a day, reach as far from the base of the plant as the widely spreading vines, often fifteen to eighteen feet.

A small fragment of the Bible, dating from the Emperor Constantine, has been found in a collection of parchments by Professor Hus. The fragment is probably a portion of one of the city laws written in scriptures which Constantine ordered distributed throughout the Greek colonies.
