## Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)  
Breakfast—Stewed flies with lemon, cereal, thin cream, buckwheat pancakes, country sausage, crisp toast, milk, coffee.  
Luncheon—Cream of chicken and rice soup, lettuce sandwiches, canned peaches, children's sponge cake, milk, tea.  
Dinner—Bouillon, toasted crackers, browned chicken, celery sauce, mashed potatoes, parsley fritters, head lettuce with Roquefort cheese dressing, cranberry sherbet, whole wheat rolls, milk, coffee.

The chicken is cooked in the morning and the liquor used for the luncheon soup. The pieces of chicken are then rolled in flour and browned in half butter and half bacon fat in a hot oven. If preferred the soup can be served the following day rather than the same day the chicken itself makes its appearance.

**Cream of Chicken and Rice Soup**  
Four cups chicken broth, 1/2 cup rice, 1 cup heavy cream, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper.  
Wash rice through many waters. Bring broth to the boiling point and add rice. Cook in double boiler for three hours. Add salt and pepper. Remove from heat and stir in cream whipped until stiff. Serve very hot. This is a nourishing delicious soup ideal for luncheon but too rich for a dinner menu.

# FORD'S PEACE SHIP BOBS UP

WASHINGTON, (NEA Special)—Elmer Davis the novelist, was in the other day, to swap Ford Peace Party reminiscences with me. We both were along on the trip. We were along reportorially, however, not as peace delegates.

Between Elmer and Mme. Rosika Schwimmer, who inspired the expedition, a red-hot controversy has been raging lately in the press. The row started over a book by Louis Lochner, Lochner was prominently identified with the peace party management and his book is a history of it. In it the author intimates that Mme. Schwimmer had a lot to do with quenching the whole affair.

Elmer, in a review of the volume for an eastern newspaper, allowed that so she did. Angered, Mme. Schwimmer came right back at him with a challenge to prove it, so now it's Elmer's turn.

What particularly stirs Rosika is a hint by Elmer that somebody probably made a rake-off out of the trip, which cost upwards of half a million, so that there was room for a little gravy on the side.

Mme. Schwimmer, in answer, scores the point that the expedition's disbursing officer was Gaston Plantiff, Henry Ford's own New York sales manager, whose probity isn't questioned, even by Elmer himself. How then, asks Rosika, do you suggest graft on the part of anybody else?

And, indeed, I venture to say, such a case would be hard word. Yet it is indisputable that Gas Plantiff had to pay a lot of bills he'd have turned down if he could have helped himself.

## Capri Strains Save Couple From Death; They Marry

ISLAND OF CAPRI, Italy. (AP)—Like Scylla and Charybdis of Greek mythology, this beautiful island, whose rugged cliffs rise sheerly out of the azure waters of the Bay of Naples, has straits. But its enchantment, unlike those whom Homer described as tempting voyagers to their doom, recall men and women from shadows of despair.

At least, Karl Aubergen and Anna Tshol, both Germans, aver that the straits exist. Aubergen and Fraulich Tshol came here separately, each intending to commit suicide because of a series of misfortunes.

They met on the cliffs and there confided in each other. Soon, under the spell of Capri's beauty, they decided to face life again—together.

When they told their story to Italian officials, financial assistance to return to Germany was given them.

in vain. The dog became quite unhappy, would not eat and had to be returned to Lady Burton's kennels.
