Austin Product in Big League for Each 8,000

AUSTIN, Tex., (AP)—One Austin product in the major leagues for each 8,000 population is basis for this city's boast that it is one of the leading "home towns" of the country, as far as big league ball games are concerned. The five Austinites who saw

service in the "big show" during last season are, "Big" Palk, Chicago White Sox outfielder; "Big" Collins, Detroit Tiger pitcher; "Spot" Falk, south of St. Louis Brown pitcher, who as a pinch hitter, led his league with club to a .699 average; Frank Gibson, Boston Brave catcher, and "Tink" Liviers, who pitched for a time for the St. Louis Cards but finished the season with Dallas of the Texas League.

Riviere already has been notified here, but attended Texas University in 1924. He was not reared here, but attended Texas University and calls Austin his home.

"Big" Palk and Collins are the best known here of the five. Both attended Austin High School and starred in baseball and football. After graduation, Palk was an outstanding football and baseball player at Texas University here, while Collins attended Texas A. & M. at College Station. He was instrumental in twice defeating Texas University, arch rival in athletics.
