lamb is allowed to get too large many farmers are afraid to operate for fear of fatal results. A sharp knife, when used in docking, makes a quick healing wound and probably offsets the advantages gained by the use of the hot iron method which makes a slow healing wound. Weather conditions are sometimes unfavorable in winter for the operation. Lambs that are docked and castrated on a warm day when it is not raining will do better than those operated on when the day is cold and drizzly. Less bleeding results when the lambs are gathered in a pen where they are allowed to quiet down before the operation.

## BEND WINS WATER SUIT

BEND, Ore.—Victories in both the injunction suit filed against them in connection with the letting of bids for the new municipal water system were won today by Bend's city officials.

Judge Higgins, who heard the case, upheld the city officials in their contention as to the authorization of the sale of \$600,000 worth of bonds for construction of the municipal water system, overruled a motion for judgment for W. B. Riley in his suit contesting the validity of the bond sale, and sustained the city's demurrer to N. F. Smith's injunction suit, which sought to prevent the letting of a contract for construction of a pipe line to Tumble creek. Unless the case is appealed, the city is now at liberty to let a contract for the construction of the pipe line.

## Farm Pointers

Bordeaux paint is a new necessity, becoming necessary in pruning and cutting out dead areas of trees in Oregon, says the experiment station. In the past neglect to disinfect pruning cuts and other wounds made these places common entry spots for wood-destroying fungi and canker parasites. Bordeaux paint when properly used is a permanent and a somewhat porous disinfectant which is harmless to the living tissues around the wounds. The paint is made by mixing raw linseed oil gradually into commercial bordeaux powder until a thick paste

is formed that can easily be applied with a paint brush. It does not work to pour the powder into the oil.

Where apple orchardists use bordeaux in the spray program it is not necessary to paint the cuts of they have been thoroughly drenched with spray. It is always necessary to paint large cuts that will not callous over in a short time.

Buck lambs of Western Oregon that are docked and castrated bring 50 cents to \$1.00 more than lambs not thus cared for. Not only does such a lamb give a better carcass, but it is cleaner around the tail and has a blockier neater appearance. Better results are obtained if the lambs are castrated and docked when they are one to two weeks old, advises H. A. Landgreen, extension specialist in animal husbandry. At this age there is less set-back and if the
