55 Enjoy Pot-Luck Supper

Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast — Baked apples, cereal, thin cream, fried cornmeal mush, sirup, crisp fried toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon — Cream of spinach soup, croissants, Boston baked beans, hot bread, orange puff pudding, milk, tea.

Dinner — Mock hot mignon, fried potatoes, tomato and celery salad, Brussels sprouts in butter, steamed fig pudding, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

Children under ten years of age should not be allowed to eat baked beans. They will find an ample luncheon without the beans. But since good, old-fashioned baked beans "go right to the spot" for many of us these chilly days the recipe follows. For older children and adults admit the dish is most acceptable, supplying much nourishment at a moderate cost.

Baked Beans. Two cups navy beans, 1-2 pound fat salt pork or bacon, 1 small onion, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons molasses, 1 tablespoon brown sugar, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon mustard, 3/4 teaspoon soda.

Pick over and wash beans. Put into cold water to cover and soak for four or five hours or over night. In the morning drain and cover with fresh water. Add soda and bring slowly to the boiling point. Simmer five minutes and drain. Do not throw the water in the sink. Discard beans in clear cold water and return to the bottle with enough fresh water to cover. Bring slowly to the boiling point and simmer until the skin wrinkles and breaks when a few beans are taken out on a spoon and blown upon. Drain beans from this water and rinse in cold water. Put at this time of the pork or bacon in the bottom of the bean pot. Add the onion peeled but uncut. Add half the beans and the remaining pork. Cover pork with beans.

Mix salt, molasses, sugar, pepper and mustard with 1 cup boiling water. Pour over beans in bean pot and add enough more boiling water to completely cover beans. Cover pot and bake five hours in a slow oven. Uncover for the last half hour of the baking, bringing pot to the top that it may become brown and crisp. (Copyright, 1925, NEA Service, Inc.)

Men and Women Librarians On Sick Leave About Same

CHICAGO, (AP)—The belief that women engaged in public or industrial work are absent from duty because of illness to a much greater extent than men is not entirely true so far as workers in public libraries are concerned.

A questionnaire conducted by the Bureau of Public Personnel Administration in cooperation with the American Library Association, shows that in sixteen public libraries in the United States there was little difference in the number of days women were on sick leave with pay and those of men library workers.
