WASHINGTON DIRECTORY OUT

WASHINGTON (NEA Special)—Congress is just out with another of its well known directories—a turkey-red one this time. The last was blue. The Congressional Directory's purpose is to inform rather than to thrill. It isn't an altogether uninteresting volume, at that.

This is the first congressional directory in history, for instance, to contain as many as three congressmen's names all at once. One of them, Mrs. Florence P. Kahn of California, packs her autobiographical sketch of herself into exactly 25 words, including her name and some dates. Mrs. Edith Nourse Rogers of Massachusetts and Mrs. Mary T. Norton of New Jersey go into a bit more detail, to the tune of 75 or 80 words apiece.

The directory takes it for granted that Smith W. Brookhart, Thomas D. Schall and Sam G. Bratton are senators respectively from Iowa, Minnesota and New Mexico, though both seats are considered—Brookhart's by Daniel F. Steck, Schall's by Magnus Johnson and Bratton's by Holm O. Bursum. Gerald P. Nye, whose right to sit with the senators is also questioned, nevertheless is one of the North Dakota senators, if the directory knows what it's talking about.

The directory likewise introduces to the senatorial world Arthur H. Robinson of Indiana, George H. ... who became William the First of England.
