This recipe for one date cake is given because it's a one-egg cake and at the same time is quite festive enough for the holiday season.

Date Cake.

One egg, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 1/2 cups boiling water, 2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup stoned and chopped dates, 1/2 cup chopped nut meats, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Four 3/4 cup boiling water over dates and let stand while mixing
