Thompson's Funniest Picture Coming To Sherrys

The roars of laughter that follow in the wake of such a production as "Charley's Aunt" reach as loudly through "The Bandit's Baby" which comes to the Sherry Theatre on Friday and Saturday. Situations that are positively new, comedy of a high order, burlesque and satire are all blended beautifully with the fast action of a rattling western tale, with Fred Thompson's remarkable personality, and with the histrionic ability of the athletic star and his equally famous horse, Silver King. "Lord Jim" Will Open 3-Day Run at Star

The story of "Lord Jim," the Paramount picture at the Star theatre Friday, Saturday and Sunday, is not only a classic among

famous tales of the sea, but is one and stirring picture of adventure in modern photography. Its theme is a great character story, plus action, heart-interest, melodrama, thrills and love-interest, adapted for the screen by John Russell from the novel by the late Joseph Conrad. "Lord Jim," produced by Victor Fleming, who made "Adventure" and "A Son of His Father," "Lord Jim" features Percy Marmont, Shirley Mason, Noah Berry and Raymond Hatton in the principal roles of the cast. From the title alone many have gotten the idea that this is a high-brow story. A glimpse of what it's all about should settle that. Marmont is first mate of the ship Patna. His heroic death wipes forever the stigma of "coward" from his name. Nowhere in the world could there have been found a man better fitted to play the role of "Lord Jim" than Percy Marmont. Even as the shrinking coward on shipboard he makes people love and sympathize with him. His atonement is a drama of astounding conflict. In his triumph over a whole island of copper-colored savages, making himself their king, Marmont gives his greatest performance since "If Winter Comes."

All the others, too, are ideally cast. The screen version of "Lord Jim" is the Conrad novel, word

for word, scene for scene. George C. Hull wrote the scenario. Clyde Cook comedy is also on the program.

'Not So Long Ago' Is Fine Comedy-Romance of 1850

A great crowd is on hand. First a false start. At the starting signal, the carriage refuses to move. Then—with a splutter and a gasp, it's off. Near the finish, it seems as though it's going to win—when the boiler explodes with a bang.

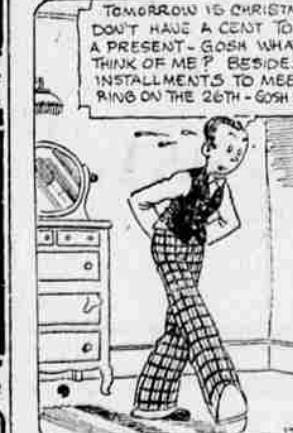
