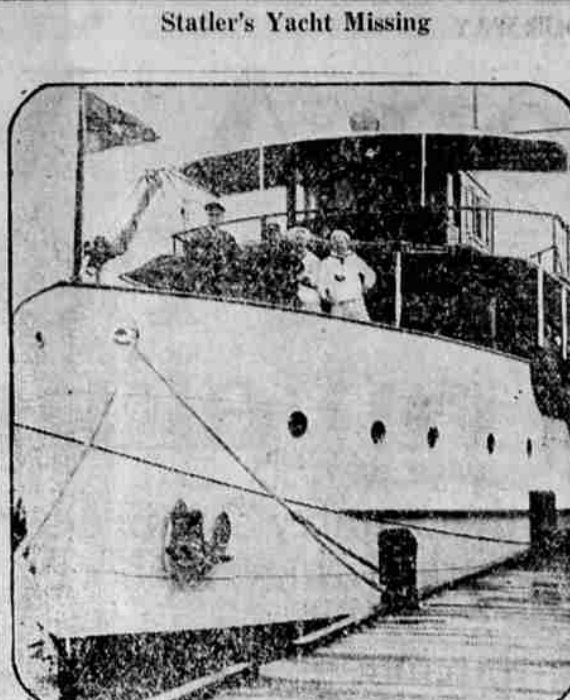
Japanese Yen Stronger.
Japan, looking forward to an eventual return to the gold standard, built up large balances in this country for the improvement of Japanese yen from a low point of 2 1/2 cents in January to above 42 cents late in the year.

The Scandinavian currencies made great forward strides with the improvement in the economic conditions of these countries. Danish kroner advanced from around 17 1/2 cents to above 25 cents and Norwegian kroner from 15 to above 22 cents, both within a few cents of par.

The position of South American exchanges also was strengthened, both Argentine pesos and Brazilian milreis adding about 5 cents each to their quoted value during the year.

Fluctuation Small.
Fluctuations of the Belgian franc and Italian lira during 1925 were limited to a one-cent range. The Belgian currency after selling above 5 cents later reached its "natural level" around 4 1/2 cents as monetary stabilization credits were placed at the disposal of the government. The Italian lira recovered most of the year around 4 cents although it fell at one time to 2 1/2. A \$20,000,000 credit obtained in the spring for its production was absorbed late in the fall by a \$100,000,000 long-term loan.

The course of the French franc was more erratic. While 1925

ACQUITTED IN MONTANA
GREAT FALLS, Mont. (By the Associated Press)—Two orders discharging cases against Leon C. Stevenson, Edward J. Bailey and Charles F. Bloomhuff, indicted jointly with Gordon Campbell, Montana oil operator, for using the mails to defraud, were signed in United States district court Monday by Judge Charles N. Pray.

The orders followed the filing of a motion for dismissal by District Attorney John L. Shattuck. Campbell was convicted in federal court here May 6, 1925, and was sentenced to two years in Leavenworth prison and to pay a fine of \$1000 and costs of the action.

Senator B. K. Wheeler of Montana was acquitted here last spring of charges that he represented Campbell before the department of the interior illegally.

War President Honored Over Nation Yesterday

NEW YORK (AP)—Five hundred cities in the United States paid homage Monday to the memory of Woodrow Wilson on the sixty-ninth anniversary of his birth.

At the Woodrow Wilson foundation dinner at the Hotel Astor Monday night, the late war president was honored for his statesmanship, his principles and ideals.

Dr. Harry A. Garfield, president of Williams college, said Mr. Wilson's clear vision and indomitable purpose gave to the world living principles for the settlement of disputes among the nations which at the close of the first quarter of the new century are bearing fruit abundantly.

THREE DROWN AT MIAMI
MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Three unidentified sailors were drowned in a midday bay front fire here which caused damage of approximately \$25,000 to shipping. The blaze of unknown origin, started on the Fletcher Asphalt Paving company's dock and ignited barrels of tar on a small lighter, spreading nearly to the steamship casleton. Three members of her crew were reported to have jumped

into the water where it is feared they were drowned. Tugs pulled the ship to safety out in the bay.
