TO BUILD SERVICE STATION

BONNERS FERRY, Idaho—The Texas Oil company has purchased from J. W. Reid, a 50-foot corner lot on Main street south of the First State bank building, the property having a 74-foot frontage on Kootenai street. The Texas company took an option on the property about six weeks ago and the purchase was approved by the head office about a week ago. The price was not announced.

Manager M. T. Huffman for the Texas company says it is planned to start construction at once on a modern brick and concrete service station on the property, to cost \$6000 to \$7000. Mr. Huffman will have charge of the station and many, at his option, operate or sub-lease it. Plans for the proposed station have been submitted to the town council and permission has been granted for the erection and operation of the service station. The station will have entrances on Main and Kootenai streets.

Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary) Breakfast—Grapes, scrambled eggs with rice, toasted bran muffins, milk, coffee. Luncheon—Baked cheese, shredded cabbage and pineapple salad, bran-bread and butter-sandwiches, filled cookies, milk, tea. Dinner—Fruit cup, roast chicken with stuffing, browned gravy, mashed potatoes, parsnip patties, French onion with Roquefort cheese dressing, ice cream sandwich, whole wheat rolls, milk, coffee.

No cereal is suggested in the breakfast menu as the rice in the egg dish and nutrias supply practically the same nutrients.

Ice cream of any preferred flavor is put between two thin pieces of sponge cake or angel food. The whole is washed with whipped cream or a chocolate sauce if vanilla ice cream makes the filling of the "sandwich."

Filled Cookies

One cup of granulated sugar, 1 cup dark brown sugar, 1 cup butter and lard combined, 1 cup butter, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3 eggs, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 tablespoon sour milk, 2 teaspoons vanilla.

Filling—One cup chopped fruit, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/2 cup water, 1 teaspoon cornstarch, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 teaspoon powdered cinnamon.

To make the filling mix and sift sugar and cornstarch adding a few grains of salt. Put water, lemon juice and eggs into saucepan and bring to the boiling point. Stir in sugar and cinnamon and cook, stirring constantly until thick. Let cool slightly and stir in vanilla.

To make cookies mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Add sugar and mix thoroughly. Rub in shortening. Beat eggs until light with a Dover beater.

MRS. ABBIE FOX BURIED. JULIETTA, Idaho—"Grandma" Abbie Fox, aged 85, died at her home here Tuesday. A few years ago she suffered a fall and never recovered.

Mrs. Fox was born in Germany. When 7 she came with her parents to the United States, settling first in Lapage county, Illinois. There she grew to young womanhood and became the wife of Joseph Fox. In 1874 they moved to

Arkansas, where they remained till 1902, when they came to Julietta. Mrs. Fox is survived by eight children: Elizabeth Colwell, Port Smith, Ark.; Kate Barringer, Purcell, Okla.; Frank Fox, Trinidad, Wash.; Abbie Raper, Weatherford, Texas; John Fox, Prairie View, Ark.; Margaret Stutz, Fort Smith, Ark.; Anna King, Prosser, Wash.; and Thomas Fox, Julietta.

Mrs. Fox was a lifelong Catholic and the funeral was held from the church here, the Rev. Father Keyey officiating.
