"Limited Mail," at Sherrys, is Real Thriller

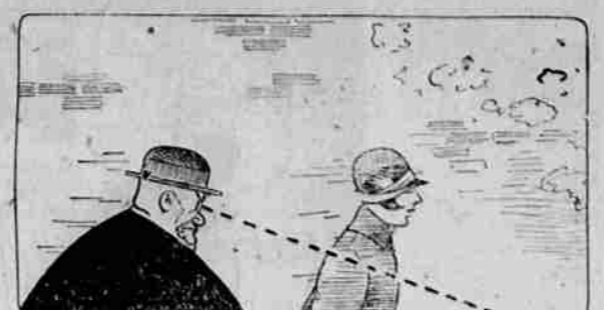

From that on her life is one round of thrills out of which comes her first and only love affair. "Daring Days" offers good, clean, wholesome amusement and should be seen by everyone. It hands out a thrill and a laugh at one and the same time.

Edward Horn, as Catamount Carson, mayor of the rival town of Catamount, heads the splendid list of players with which Universal has surrounded the story. Horn is convincing in a role that might easily be overdone. Fred Cole takes a difficult character and makes much out of it.
