SMELTER PLANS SHAPED. BAKER, Ore. - The Union Smelter company, with headquarters at Denver and which for some time has been making an investigation along the Snake river between Huntington and Homestead is planning a smelter at some favorable point, it was announced here. It was said that options had been taken on sites at Robinson and on the Snake river near the mouth of Burnt river. The intention is to make the final decision on location in the next 30 days.

The smelter plant as proposed would have a capacity of 150 tons of ore a day to start with, and would be increased in size from time to time.

Monte Blue Stars In "Limited Mail" At Sherrys.

Monte Blue for this season will be featured in stories for which his past life and training had fitted him. He had been known as cowboy, athlete, fireman, sailor, soldier, lumberjack, miner, rail-roader and carpenter before.

He was discovered by D. W. Griffith in 1914 at work around the old Biograph studio. Given a small part by that director, Monte Blue proved so good that his picture career began right there and then.

He had won numerous cups and ribbons as an athlete, and his early characterizations were all husky young heroes of the great outdoors.

However, gradually he began to play different type roles. Gone were the overalls, sturdy boots and carefree manners of his old parts, and in their place the graceful manners of the drawing room.

Monte had become a sophisticated young man - on the screen. This was the beginning of such productions as "The Marriage Circle," "Being Respectable," "How to Educate a Wife," "The Lover of Camille," "Her Marriage Vow," "Recompense" and "Kiss Me Again."

The lanky, lounging boy with the tanned face had disappeared, and in his place was the correct, subtle young man of the world. But Blue rebelled; and is now realizing an ambition of long standing - his return to his love - in a big railroad drama.

In "The Limited Mail" at Sherrys today he has one of his best characterizations as a young engineer on a mail train, who finds peace and happiness in the West among the rugged mountains of Colorado. George Hill directed this picturization of Elmer Van-

ce's melodrama, for which Darryl Francis Zaneck wrote the scenario. Comedy showing "Spooky Spooks."

Betty Bronson Stars In "Golden Princess" Coming to Arcade

"The Golden Princess," which will be shown at the Arcade theatre Friday and Saturday, is of especial interest to the picture-going population, and for a two-fold reason. It marks the debut of Betty Bronson as a full-fledged film star, and it deals with a significant and picturesque period of American history - the California gold rush of 1849.

Ever since Betty scored such an instantaneous success with her delightful portrayal of "Petey Parr," her meteoric career has been watched with a good deal of undiminished admiration, and there will be none to begrudge her this crowning promotion which elevates her to stardom.

As the heroine of "The Golden Princess," Betty is said to have a part that suits her to the proverbial "T." Picture her as a little mountain girl, made an orphan through the violent death of her father and the desertion of a faithless mother, reared by a Spanish mission padre at an Indian settlement, and suddenly brought in contact with the rough and ready atmosphere of the gold mining camps.

Can you imagine her dressing up in typical miner's outfit, discarding gold, winning love, fighting handily and stringing up no end of excitement? Well, that's just exactly what she does!

A flashing, thrilling melodrama credit to the Best Harle story from which Frances Agnew adapted it, Clarence Badger, the

director, took particular pains to reproduce with faithful accuracy the historic settings and hectic life of the days of '49. Nell Hamilton, Rockcliffe Fellows, Thelma Haver and Joseph Dowling are the principal supporting players.

## Navajo Indian Chief in Picture Coming to Star

Chief Big Head, a college graduate, does not belie his cognomen. He has a large, magnificent head set on broad, tawny shoulders and stands a full six feet, two inches in his moosecased feet.

But what is more, he has exceptional mental ability which entitles him to his name, which would be a misnomer indeed in the world "well" were substituted for "Big."

Frank J. Carroll, the motion picture producer, discovered him while strolling scenes in southwestern Colorado for his spectacular photoplay, "The Scarlet West," which "First National" will present at the Star theatre Friday, Saturday and Sunday. He found Chief Big Head, who is a member of the Navajo tribe from Shiprock, N. M. to be born outdoors' stage manager.

And so Producer Carroll used Big Head to good advantage in staging the Custer battle scenes, which are a high point in this thrilling photodrama of the early west. Some two thousand Indians were used in the filming of this big spectacle and Chief Big Head turned out to be more than a mere interpreter in aiding Carroll.

The Indians were all mounted and Big Head's formations of the large body of wild-riding horse-men made a picture which Carmine the Indian's knowledge of the red man's maneuvers in battle.

This scene, representing Custer's Last Stand, is declared to be the greatest movement of Indians on horseback ever staged before a motion picture camera.

The production was many months in the making, the government permitting Indians from the Navajo and Ute reservations in the southwest to participate, and a large number of real cowboys and soldiers also took part.

Leading roles are played by Robert Fraser, Clara Bow, Robert McEwan, Johnnie Walker, Walter McEwan and Gaston Glass.

An Indian is a hero of the romantic story, which is an innovation in screen history.

SHOT FIRED IN QUARREL. LAKEVIEW, Ore. - Harry Calderwood, prominent rancher of Plush, is in jail and Dorris Pulcher of Port Bidwell is lying near death, following an altercation at Adel during which Calderwood shot Fulcher through the abdomen. The cause of the quarrel had not been learned, according to Sheriff Friday, who investigated. A number of persons witnessed the shooting, which took place in front of a dance hall. Some of the witnesses said that they believed the men were in dispute over one of their companions.

Physicians believe it may be possible to save the wounded man's life. No statement has been obtained from Fulcher by the authorities.

MEDFORD TO SELL LOTS. MEDFORD, Ore. - The city council, which has had a special sale on through local realty dealers of its delinquent tax-owned lots on paved streets at \$50 down and \$10 a month thereafter, during which over 60 lots have been sold, announced that it had withdrawn the 25 remaining unsold lots from the realtors and would itself sell the remainder of the paved lots beginning next Friday or Monday at \$10 down and \$10 a month.

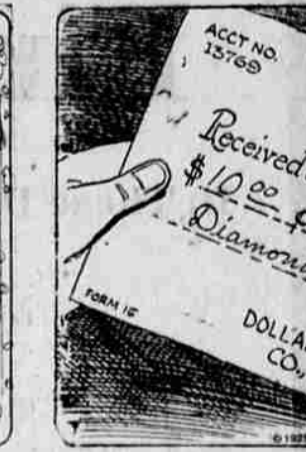
