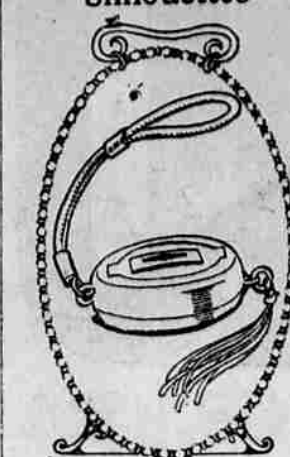

Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)
Breakfast—Stewed dried apricots, whole wheat cereal, thin cream, codfish puffs, corn bread, milk, coffee.
Luncheon—Baked spinach, brown bread, head lettuce salad, coconut pudding, milk, tea.
Dinner—Broiled porterhouse steak, mashed potatoes, stewed onions, quince salad, cran rolls, jelly roll cake, milk, coffee.
With the exception of the warm breakfast bread and the dinner salad, there are no dishes suggested for the day's menu not suitable for young children. The luncheon pudding uses up stale bread crumbs to advantage.
Coconut Pudding
Three cups milk, 1/2 cup fresh grated coconut, 2 1/2 cups graham bread crumbs, 1-2 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1 tablespoon butter, 1/2 teaspoon salt.
Beat eggs, add sugar, salt and milk and beat a few minutes longer. Add coconut. Add bread crumbs and softened butter and turn into a well-buttered baking dish. Bake in a slow oven until firm to the touch, about 30 minutes. Serve warm, with or without lemon juice.

Breakfast—Stewed figs, cereal, thin cream, crisp rice toast, French pancakes, sirup, milk, coffee.
Luncheon—Mashed spinach with creamed oysters, brown bread, peas and softening milk, tea.
Dinner—Cream of lima bean soup, chicken, and pineapple salad, whole wheat bread, chocolate soufflé, milk, coffee.

In this dinner menu each dish adds many calories of various nutrients. In order to make a well-balanced meal plenty of lettuce must be served and eaten with the salad. Otherwise the dinner will be lacking in bulk or "roughness." One pint can peas, 4 tablespoons rice, 4 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon butter, 2 cup milk, 2 eggs, 1/2 lemon, one half teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 4 tablespoons powdered sugar.

Wash rice well through several waters and let stand in cold water to cover for 1 hour. Drain. Add milk in top of double boiler. Add rice, sugar, grated fat and juice of lemon, butter and salt. Cook over boiling water until tender. Stir in yolks of eggs and cook, stirring constantly about 1 minute longer. Press into a shallow mold. When cold and firm re-

move from mold onto a large plate. Strain sirup from pears. If sirup is not sweet add 1/2 cup sugar to 1 cup juice and boil rapidly until reduced to one-half cup. Add pears and vanilla and let stand until fruit is thoroughly heated. Arrange pears on top of mold and pour over sirup. Beat whites of egg until stiff and dry and fold in powdered sugar. Spread over top and sides of mold. Put into a moderate oven for eight minutes to brown the meringue.

Many farmers inquired about prices, but were disappointed since there was no demand from the coast, virtually all dealers here purchasing only on orders from the coast.
Milling houses have supplies on hand. Approximately 60 per cent of the wheat has been sold in the county, leaving about 2,000,000 bushels in the hands of the farmers.
