Two Churches Will Welcome New Pastors

Parish Homecoming and Educational Rally Feature Services for First Sunday of New Year.

The inception sermons of two pastors who will greet their respective congregations for the first time tomorrow, an all-day parish homecoming, and a week-end educational rally with programs featured by a college speaker and singers—these are chief among the attractions announced for the first services of the new year in La Grande tomorrow.

The Rev. C. V. Dunn, a former president of the Spokane university, will mount the pulpit at the "Christian church tomorrow to address his parishioners at their annual all-day gathering. His message subject will be "The Marks of Jesus." For evening he announces, "What Shall We Do With Jesus?" The day will be marked by a mountain-day dinner, with business meeting and election of officers following.

The new pastor comes to La Grande from Newberg, Ore., where he has been preaching the last six months. He was born and reared in Ohio, receiving his higher education at Bethany college, West Virginia, and at Yale university. His pastorates have included Sallina, Kan., and Louisville, Ky. At Spokane university, he was both minister and instructor. His wife and two children, Winifred Grace and Charles Harlan, are at Spokane, where the youngsters are attending school. They will join him here in a short time.

St. Peter's Episcopal.
Services will be resumed in the Episcopal church tomorrow with the Rev. Oliver Riley, rector lately from Pierre, S. D., officiating. He and Mrs. Riley are making their home temporarily at 902 Main avenue.

For his sermon at 11 a. m., following church school at 9:45, the Rev. Mr. Riley has chosen as his subject, "Americanization." There will be choral celebration of the mass. Evening prayer and sermon will be at 7:30 o'clock.

Both Canadian and Central American charges figure in the new Episcopalian leader's career as a clergyman. He is a St. John's college graduate, and an alumnus, also, of St. Chad's seminary. He has served as chaplain for both the American Legion and the South

Dakota legislature, has membership in the Kiwanis, the Eastern Star, and has attained prominence in the Masonic orders.

Overseas during the world war, he served as captain in the Canadian Expeditionary forces.

Church of the Nazarene.
The Rev. E. W. Dodson, who is field representative for the Northwest Nazarene college, and the college quartet will furnish the program for the week-end educational rally that is to commence with a meeting at 7:30 o'clock this evening in the Church of the Nazarene.

This parish was in the midst of its revival campaign when other churches were celebrating American Education week, and is making up for the omission with a special series of services devoted to learning's cause.

Bible school will be at 9:45 a. m. tomorrow, followed by an 11 o'clock service in charge of Mr. Dodson. James Seeger will lead the Y. P. S. meeting at 6:30. The evening meeting will be under supervision of Mr. Dodson and the college quartet. A general invitation is extended. Meetings are held in the Riverside chapel, three blocks north and a block west of Second street. The Rev. L. D. Mezzers is pastor.

Presbyterian.
The sacrament of the Lord's supper will be celebrated at the 11 o'clock worship hour in the Presbyterian church. The Rev. William Crosby Ross, pastor, issues a call to all members of the parish to participate in this quarterly observance. The quartet will sing "The Night Song of Bethlehem" and the minister will sound the year's text.

Sunday school will be at 9:45 a. m., with a renewed invitation to all who desire to learn of the Master Teacher under competent instruction in a well-equipped school of religion.

Following the Christian Endeavor meeting, the evening services will commence at 7:30 o'clock. The Bible character from whose life the lesson is to be taken will be Solomon.

First Methodist.
"The New Year" is the subject the Rev. Henry W. Parker has selected for the New Year's message he will deliver to his congregation at 11 o'clock Sunday morning. Appropriate music will be furnished by the choir.

Advancement Pronounced In Past Year

Congregations of Many La Grande Churches Pass Through Period of Great Activity.

A glance backward over the history of the churches in La Grande for the last 12 months reveals a number of changes in leadership, as well as many improvements in the parish buildings.

The Presbyterian congregation, a year ago today, had just become accustomed to its fine new quarters. Additional improvements this past year have included the installation of a splendid pipe organ, decoration of the church, construction of a kitchenette and seating facilities for the balcony. The Rev. William Crosby Ross, pastor, is now the veteran clergyman of the local ministry.

Rector Becomes Archbishop.
St. Peter's Episcopal parishioners were also settling themselves in a beautiful new home last year, having recently moved there from the little frame building that was the oldest of all the churches in La Grande. A gift from Mrs. M. P. Honan, widow of one of the city's prominent physicians, made the new home possible. The year has seen the exodus of the Rev. S. W. Crosby to Pendleton, where he took up the duties of archdeacon of the Eastern Oregon diocese and within the past week—the coming of the Rev. Oliver Riley, from Pierre, S. D., as the new rector.

Division of the Latter Day Saints membership into two wards—one of 400 members, and the other, with 200—necessitated the remodeling of a residence as temporary chapel for the smaller group. The building of a more suitable church home.

Election which took place in September placed Lester Stoddard in the bishop's seat, succeeding George R. Lyman, over the larger group, which meets for worship in the lower story of the tabernacle; and Grant Bean, succeeding Louis Adams, over the smaller division.

Enlarge Auditorium.
Partitions were torn out to enlarge the auditorium of the Christian Science church, which stands at First street and Washington avenue, within the last year. After the remodeling, the interior of the building was redecorated and a new desk installed.

Improvements to the amount of nearly \$4000 marked the year's progress for the Zion Evangelical Lutheran parish. Included in the scheme and additions were the building of a community hall annex, 15 by 38 feet in dimensions, and a vestibule for the church proper; installing of a beautiful new altar and reading desk, and a furnace. Thirteen handsome cathedral windows, seven of them memorial gifts, greatly improved the appearance of the edifice. The interior was remodeled and decorated after the general building had been completed. The pastor, the Rev. W. E. Hall, came to La Grande two years ago from Everett, Wash., where he built a church during his pastorate.

Purchase Building Lots.
With the construction of a house of worship at some future time as their purpose, the Church of the Nazarene made a purchase of two building lots, at the corner of Y avenue and 4th street, a few months ago. Alterations in the parsonage contributed the building program of the year past. The Rev. E. W. Dodson has been pastor only six months, having come to La Grande the first of June.

Your Sunday school rooms have been added to the Church of God building since last January. The little congregation had just held its first service in its new home a year ago this week. The Rev. Claude C. Pratt is pastor as well as organizer of the church.

Pastor Visits Europe.
Our Lady of the Valley Catholic church had two substitute pastors last summer while the Rev. Father O. Nooy took a six-months vacation trip to the old world. The first, the Rev. Father Buckley, was here but a few weeks, being succeeded then by the Rev. Father Shadet, who, when the regular pas-
