ODGEN PACKERS HANDLE 1,304,548 ANIMALS IN 1925

ODGEN, Utah, (AP)—A total of 1,304,548 animals was handled in the Odgen union stockyards in the year closing Thursday, according to figures given out by L. F. Whitlock, manager. The yards handled 155,541 cattle, as against 146,204 for 1924; 884,237 sheep, as against 564,694 last year, and 265,168 hogs, as against 280,238 last year. While hog receipts showed a decrease, the increase in cattle and sheep brought the total receipts above those of 1924.

The yards handled 1129 horses this year, as against 1967 last year. The feature price for the year was that of \$10.10, establishing a record on Idaho grass-fed steers.

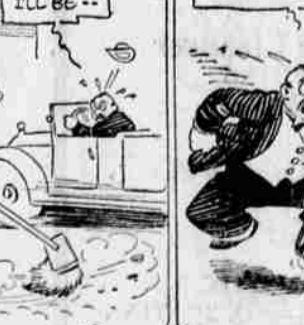
