The state land board, in making the sale to the Federal company, has specified strict regulation for the protection of other timber by burning the slashings and in other ways.

I. H. Nash, state land commissioner, and Ben Bush, state appraiser, opened the bids. The state appraised the timber at \$1 for fir, \$3 for yellow pine and \$4 for white pine, and the Federal company bid this price, which is considered unusually high.

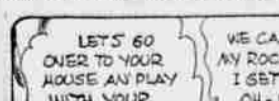

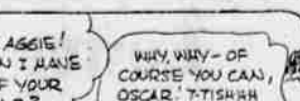
