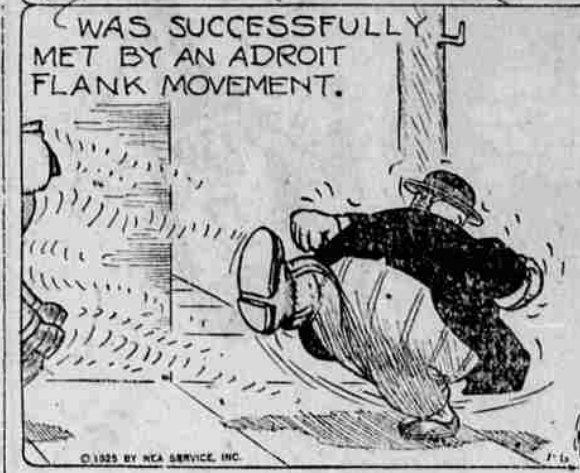
Skyscraper to Stand on Ground Given to Youth
