Woman Legislator Sees Sex as Good Leader

UCUM, Ky. (AP)—In many cases women are better qualified to be the head of the family than the men. Is the attitude of Mrs. H. G. Jorris, Kentucky's only legislator-elect.

When the General Assembly convenes January 5, she will be Kentucky's law making body of 135 members. She will represent two counties in the house.

Asked what a woman's idea of proper legislation was, she reported her stand as "very masculine." She saw no reason why a woman's idea should not be identical with those of men.

"The time is now here and has been for some years, when women are placed upon an equal footing with men when it comes to the question of making a support for themselves or families."

"In fact, in many cases the women are better qualified to be the head of the family than the men. There is only a very small sentiment of the old Kentucky chivalry in the minds of the people today and this condition prevails throughout the entire country."

Mrs. Jorris, woman farmer, supported eight brothers and sisters when her parents died while she was young. Since Mr. Jorris' death in 1920, she has stayed on the farm here in Tusset county with her three younger boys.

She believes legal restrictions should be removed to place women "absolutely upon a par with men in every respect as to their personal liberties and property rights."

She will fight for legislation as to woman's ownership of real estate and the right to dispose of it at will.

Mrs. Jorris is not unduly militant of grated cheese, tomatoes, celery and thinly sliced minced onion. Dot with bits of butter and sprinkle with salt and sugar. Baked Rice and Tomatoes One-half cup uncooked rice, 2 cups canned tomatoes, 1 cup grated cheese, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup diced celery, 1 small onion, 1 tablespoon butter, 2 teaspoons sugar. Melt rice until about half done. Put a layer of rice into a well-buttered baking dish, add a layer

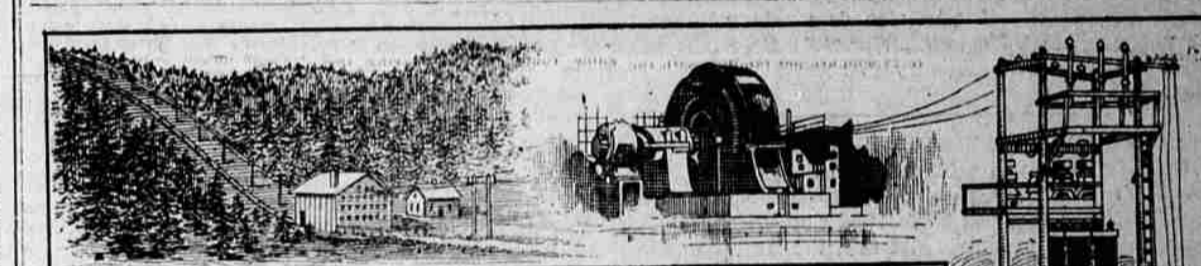
