NASH COMPANY IS ORGANIZED

The La Grande Nash company, with direct dealer connections with Wentworth & Irwin, of Portland, Ore., distributors of Nash and Ajax cars, has been established here with A. R. Trachsel in charge. The company is moving into the Bohnenkamp building at the corner of Jefferson avenue and Elm street in the quarters where the H. C. Hamilton company, no longer operative here, formerly were located.

Temporary engine service is now maintained with Tracy Holtzner but Mr. Trachsel announces that in the spring the company will establish a permanent service department. A sales department is now active.

Mr. Trachsel located here after a long residence in Alaska, broken only during the war, when he enlisted in the army air service. His military training was received at the University of Illinois and Ellington Field, Texas.

"The Nash policy of initial motor car value plus satisfactory service will be strictly adhered to by the La Grande Nash company," he states. "Later on a permanent service shop will be established and equipped with special Nash tools."

A parcel of Ajax automobiles arrived here during the week and another shipment, including the new advanced six four-door Nash sedans, is expected momentarily. "Nash owners are particularly invited to inspect this car," the distributor said today.

Some drivers do not change the oil in the engine or add to it until the pressure gauge indicates a lack of oil. This is a bad practice and has burned out many bearings. Check the oil level at regular intervals and change the oil by draining out the old oil every 750 or 1000 miles.

The charging rate of the generator should not be over ten or twelve amperes. A high charging rate will overheat the battery causing rapid evaporation of the water and buckling the plates. It also puts an overload on the generator.

Do not slip the clutch excessively. Slip ping it makes the clutch do all the work that the transmission was designed to do.
