CAREES OF STATE GROW
SALEM, Ore.—The population of the several state institutions increased from 4482 on January 1, 1925 to 4623 on January 1, 1926, according to a report prepared here for consideration of the state board of control.

The population of the several institutions, as set out in the report, follows: State hospital, 1851; penitentiary, 470; feeble minded home, 788; boys' training school, 181; tuberculosis hospital, 153; blind school, 44; deaf school 119; girls' school, 71; eastern Oregon hospital, 778; soldiers home, 116; blind school, Portland, 11.

EUGENE LEVY LOWERED.
EUGENE, Ore.—Eugene property owners this year will pay 25.71 taxes on every \$100 valuation assessed upon their property, according to the levies in cities of Lane county as announced by Assessor Ben Keeney yesterday. The total levy in this city is 67.4 mills as compared with 68.1 mills last year and levies in other cities are as follows:

Cohung, 77.5 mills and 82.2 last year; Cottage Grove, 66.4 mills and 74.8 last year; Creswell, 46.7 mills and 50.5 last year; Florence, 55 mills and 58.8 mills last year; Junction City, 63.1 mills and 64.4 mills last year; Springfield, 74.4 mills and 69.2 mills last year.

INDIAN SCHOOL GETS AID
SALEM, Ore.—Appropriations aggregating \$321,500 for the Chemawa Indian school have been included in the interior department appropriation bill, which was reported out by a committee of congress here from Representative Hawley.

The items included in the appropriation were \$262,000 for maintenance of 900 students, \$30,000 for drainage and general repairs, \$70,000 for a dining hall and kitchen and \$10,000 for industrial equipment.
