26 RESCUED FROM SNOW. DENVER, Colo., Jan. 11.—More than 25 persons stranded in automobiles on snow-blocked highways between Denver and Limon, Colo., were rescued Monday. The travelers reported that fence posts were burned to save them from freezing.
