## Problem of Buying Is Factor with Immigrants

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP).—Assimilating the immigrant, and particularly his wife, to the great American way of buying is an important aim of enlighten agencies. Miss Sophonisba P. Breckinridge, professor of social economy at the University of Chicago, found in her study of "New Homes for Old."

Reporting the agencies' work on a subject nearest to immigration, Americanization, Miss Breckinridge said that from the viewpoint of arrivals, saving is the problem over there; that spending is the problem here.

Miss Breckinridge was the first woman to be licensed to practice law in Kentucky.

"Adjustment to the new eating conditions was the hardest problem of the newcomer," she declared. "In the old country the price of meat was prohibitive. Fruit, vegetables, and dairy products were enjoyed virtually without any money."

"Here the native belief was that much meat must be eaten. Excessive use of coffee, strictly a new habit, followed, and the general custom now used to put the coffee pot on the stove in the morning and leave it there all day for any member of the family to help him and himself. Soup for breakfast had been the Old World men."

"While the housekeeper had been used to storing vegetables in quantities, potatoes in casks, and cabbage by fermentation processes, and other vegetables and fruits by drying, Mrs. American uses do not do that sort of thing. There was no place for storage; the initial cost of vegetables was high and the quality poor, and the foreign women knew nothing of modern processes of canning."

"Day by day buying was the American cue. Women and children bought for the Old World newly landed."

"We found among 89 mothers 43 who did all their own buying, 22 who allow the children to do part, four who shared the task with the father, and only 16 who never did any of the buying."
