Fire Discloses Inland Town Once Had Big Navy Yard

**CHARLOTTE, N. C. (AP)**—This inland city was once the possessor of an extensive navy yard. Down in the railroad section, a few blocks of Tryon Street, a thoroughfare named after General Tryon, one-time governor of His Majesty's colony of North Carolina, a heap of blackened ashes marks the spot where 69 years ago the Confederate government rushed the Norfolk navy yard supplies to save them from capture by the Northern army.

This came about the erection of what has been claimed, here as "the far inland navy yard in modern history."

The incident that is credited with having thrown the Southern executives into flight over the safety of their Norfolk station, was the battle in Hampton Roads between the Monitor and Merrimac. Tools and machinery from Virginia yards were hastily loaded aboard flat cars and sent southward to Charlotte.

Frame structures were hurriedly constructed on acquired property and included a gun carriage shop, a laboratory, and a torpedo shop. Next a large shop was built in which was made the largest hammer turned out in the south up to that period. Here also shafting was forged for all the Confederate "iron clads." Rifles, solid shot, shells and torpedoes were manufactured, as well as batteries for all vessels.

Eleanor Boardman gave this reviewer the surprise of his life last night at the Snodgrass Theatre. Miss Boardman has always been a capable actress, and in the last two or three pictures has shown a growing gift for comedy, but in "Exchange of Wives," Hobart Henley's production for Motographwyn-Mutual, she is revealed as a distinctly different type of character, one that can compare to go to other actresses on the screen.

Just as Dorothy Gish, "Candace," "Tarnished" and "Mable Normand" have developed distinct comedy types, Miss Boardman has created this one with her portrayal of the sophisticated and self-willed "Mrs. Morgan."
