DR. PARKER HOLDS PRAYER MEETING AT ARMY REVIVAL

Dr. Henry W. Parker moved his midweek prayer meeting from the First M. E. church to the Salvation Army hall last evening for the oldtime revival services that are in progress there. About 30 men and women were in attendance.

Taking for his text the question, "What Shall We Do With Jesus, Which is Called the Christ?" the Rev. William Crosby Ross, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, outlined the four possible attitudes as: Absolute indifference; absolute denial; giving the question a thought; and acceptance.

"The door must be opened to the Christ from the inside," declared the speaker.

Tonight's speaker will be the Rev. Hall K. Wallis, pastor of the Community church at Island City. La Grande's clergymen have responded generously to Ensign Barker's request for support of the camp meeting revivals. Last evening Dr. Parker addressed a well-attended service on the subject, "God's Wonderful Love." A mother's love is the only affection that approaches the tender passion of God for his children, he told his hearers.
