INTEREST IN LIBRARY IS HIGH HERE

The daily average.

With addition of seven periodicals, the reading public finds 65 of its favorite magazines on the racks.

The organization of two new branches is one of the ends the library staff has in view for the present year. They planned to serve the school children who live at inconvenient distances from the central building.

A station with about 200 books is maintained at the hospital. Miss Blanch Herberger of the library staff called there once a week and carrying books to all patients able to receive visitors.

County Jail Served.
The county jail also is served. And at least once a month the prisoners draw up a list of the books they want to read. A call for Victor Hugo or something from Dickens is not unusual from that source, Miss Doty reports.

Every Saturday of the 52 weeks covered by the library's report, the school children have been gathered in the reading room for a program of stories. Miss Gertrude Wagener, the juvenile librarian, has visited practically all grades in the public school system, giving educational book talks. Recently she organized a book club to acquaint the youngsters with the various classifications of reading matter. The group meets each Saturday morning right after the story hour. At the close of a 12-week period, they are preparing to present a book pageant. The results of the club's study is shown in the increased call for volumes represented in the class they are studying. Among the adult borrowers, about 70 per cent of the calls are for fiction, Miss Doty reports.

Much Reference Work.
Reference work, constitutes a large portion of the service that the library affords its patrons. Not only do educators, teachers and students make use of this department, but housewives and business men also find it indispensable. All manner of telephone questions are answered, from "Where can I learn about rope pulling?" to "What is a good recipe for angel food cake?" One hundred thirty volumes of nonfiction were borrowed from the state library last year to satisfy requests for information that lay outside the local library shelves.

The library has no bindery of its own, usually sending its volumes to Portland when they have to be rebound, but never a month passes when less than four books do not find their way in the repair room for a patch, a few stitches or a swipe of fluid glue.

And what with reading courses, special exhibits, reference work, repairing, circulation, and cataloging of new books, Miss Doty and her three assistants, Missa Wagener, Herberger and Edna Nethever, find working days more than crowded full.

Twenty-eight new volumes are ready to go into circulation at a week-end Saturday evening. Usually such an event finds a group of eager patrons waiting to draw their favorite authors.
