

BILL RUSH MAY HALT PROGRAM

WASHINGTON (NEA Special)—Such a row is developing in congress over the appropriation of money for new federal buildings, here, there, and everywhere throughout the land, that it seems quite likely some will be appropriated at all.

Government buildings class as "pork" among congressmen. There are other kinds of "pork," too, like river and harbor improvements, but government buildings are a mighty good kind.

Congressmen are very fond of "pork" and so little of it has been served out in so long a time that everybody's fairly starving for some.

The government hasn't been doing any building to speak of, or even repairing, since America went into the war, and a certain amount of this sort of work really is needed, as the president himself admits.

The minute, however, that so much as a whisper of a federal building appropriation is heard, about nine-tenths of all the congressmen want to get in on it, each in his own district's interest. It doesn't make a bit of difference whether a congressman's district needs a building or not. His voters, through him, demand their share of the money, and other congressmen help him to get it so that he'll help them.

The president wanted to spend just as little as possible and

thought he'd figured out a way to head the congressmen off.

His plan was to have congress appropriate 150 million dollars and leave it to Secretary of the Treasury Mellon and Postmaster General New to spend as they deem best, their departments being the ones most of the buildings are needed for.

Congress instantly let out a loud howl, and as soon as it convened its members lost no time in introducing a few more than 700 bills for individual public buildings in their various districts, which was pretty good considering that there are only 351 congressmen, counting senators and representatives both. One building apiece wasn't enough for some.

And whereas the president's estimate was 150 millions, congress bills call for approximately 350.

"Temple of Sacrifice" Will Be Providence War Memorial

PROVIDENCE, R. I. (AP)—A "Temple of Sacrifice" in monumental form, unlike any other World War memorial in the East, will be erected by the Providence memorial committee on a design presented by Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney.

Rising from a circular base 70 feet in diameter to a height of 270 feet will be a huge round fortress-tower of brick and terra cotta on a steel frame, surmounted by a sculptured temple of sacrifice. Within will be a powerful beacon light which at night can be seen for 30 miles across Narragansett bay, lighted torches on the outside of the temple will add to its effectiveness.

The interior will have stone floors and plastered walls. In the base will be commodious rooms for war trophies, records and other purposes.

BISMARCK, N. D. (AP)—Innate ability with machinery and tools may eventually lead the American Indian to a new place in the sun, believes Clark B. Dickinson, head of the government Indian school for girls here.

During his ten years in the Indian service, Dickinson says, he has found that the Indian was an ingenuity and an ability with tools which most white men would envy. This is the result, he thinks, of long centuries in which the Indian was compelled to devise tools to meet his peculiar conditions.
