Luncheon—Veal timbales, stewed potatoes, apple and celery salad, ginger cookies, milk, tea.

Dinner—Baked spare-ribs, potatoes baked with meat, buttered parsnips, jellied cabbage salad, jelly, whole wheat bread, lemon sponge, milk, coffee.

A light meat course is suggested for the dinner menu since meat is also served at noontime. The veal timbales take care of meat left from the veal pot roast, used in the preceding dinner.

Try "stewed potatoes" the next time you serve pork chops. They will "go right to the spot."

1 medium-sized onion, 4 cups diced potatoes, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup boiling water.

Melt butter and lard and stir in flour. When smooth add onion finely minced. Stir until blended and add the potatoes which are uncooked. Add boiling water and cover the pan closely. Cook 20 minutes. The potatoes should be tender and the water all cooked away. Just enough water to prevent burning is used. Season with salt and pepper when half cooked.
