TWO HUNTERS MARRIED

GIANTS PASS, Ore., A. B. Davis and Dr. R. W. Stearns are looking back at one of the narrowest escapes in their experience, after having spent Tuesday night marooned on a small island in Tule lake. The two local sportsmen had been hunting geese in Tule lake. When they started for shore, the ice began to break, forcing them to take refuge on the island. They are suffering from badly frozen feet and from the exposure. Dr. Stearns was confined to his bed, but Mr. Davis was able to be at his office, though his feet are badly swollen.

From 3 o'clock in the afternoon until 3 o'clock Wednesday morning, the two men remained on the island, pushing their feet in order to keep warm. It was bitterly cold, their clothes freezing to their bodies. After 12 hours in the middle of the lake, the start was made for the shore 19 miles of travel being necessary on the ice, which again had become solid. This was negotiated by 8 o'clock. Klamath Falls being reached at 11:29 a. m.

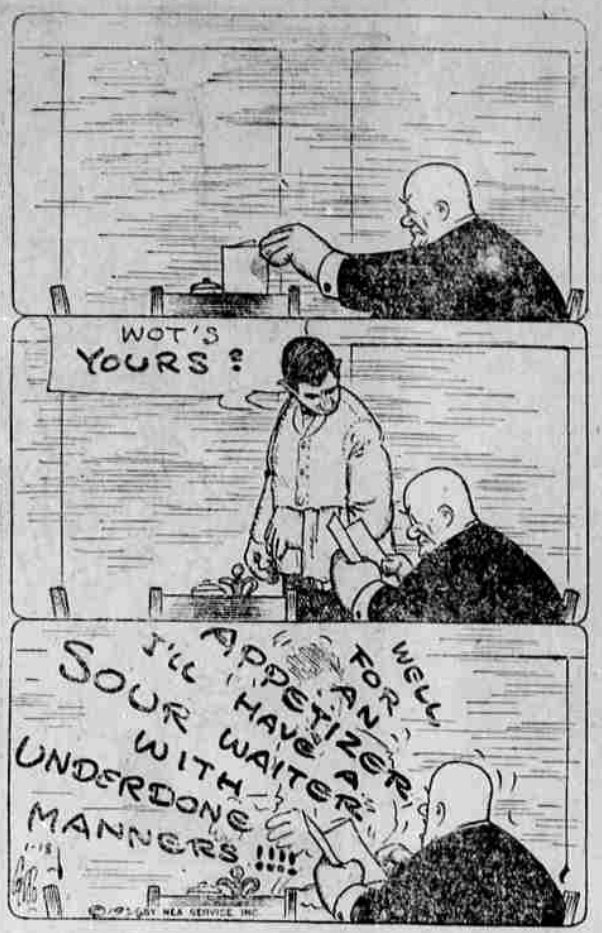

AMERICAN HEADS LIBERIAN ARMY WAS CHAUFFEUR

WASHINGTON (NEA Special)—An American has been given command of the Liberian army. An Afro-American, at that. What's more he's a good soldier. The War Department in Washington testifies to it and the War Department knows, for he's served under the Stars and Stripes since 1918.

The new head of the Liberian military establishment is Hansen Outley, late sergeant in the 24th United States cavalry, World War veteran and all that. Outley was in Washington recently, getting himself discharged from the 24th securing a passport and winding up his other American affairs, with a view to a long stay abroad.

This is the first time an American Negro has been headed an army command and War Department folk were a bit interested, as they were at the Department of State, too. Outley has a first class military record and his superiors were glad to fix matters to enable him to accept his Liberian offer, though sorry to see him go.

Originally General (formerly Sergeant) Outley is from Houston, Tex. He worked as a chauffeur and electrician before enlisting in the 24th Field Artillery at Jefferson Barracks, Mo., in September, 1915, when he was 23 years old.

During America's participation in the World War he had a hand in all the fighting on the St. Die sector and the fact that he won his way to a sergeantcy speaks for itself. After the war he was shifted to the cavalry army and was stationed at Ft. Riley, Kas., when he received Liberia's call.

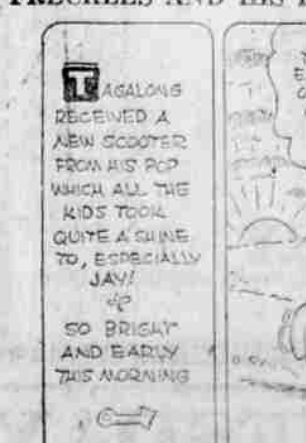
