CITY TO SPEND \$100,000
 McMinnville, Ore.—Improvement to the city water and light service costing \$100,000 are contemplated for 1926. It was announced this week by the public utilities commission.

The light department, which with the water service is municipally owned, will add a 700-horsepower Diesel engine to the two engines now used in the generating station here.

The water department announced that it would start construction this summer of a dam on Hawluta creek to impound 30,000 gallons of water in a subsidiary reservoir.

Young People of Japan Are Not Marrying Early As of Old
 TOKYO, (AP)—Very young Japanese are not getting married these days, governmental statistics show. In the old days marriages were contracted between young men of 17 or 18 and girls of 15 and 16 years of age. An official inquiry indicated that the average marriageable age for men is 27 and for women 23.

The tendency toward late marriage is said to be due to modern economic conditions.

New Czech Parliament Has But Twelve Women Members
 PRAGUE, (AP)—Czechoslovakia's new Parliament has twelve women members—eight in the House of Deputies, and four in the Senate—out of a total membership of 450 in the two houses.

The comparatively small proportion of women was rather a surprise in view of the fact that well over half the 7,000,000 voters are women, and that much encouragement is given women to participate in public affairs.

The Office of President of the Republic may even be held by a woman.
