**TONY LAZERRE
 BEST OF CROP**

CHICAGO (AP)—Probably the outstanding player to come out of the West for trial in the major leagues this spring is Tony Lazerre, purchased at what was said to be a "fancy" price by the New York Yankees from the Salt Lake City club of the Pacific Coast league.

Lazerre ranked high in the coast league averages for the 1925 season because of his extra base hitting and fine work on the bases and in the field. His batting average of .323, however, is only ten points better than that of Oscar Vitt, who was on the same club with Lazerre last year.

The Pacific coast averages disclose interesting data on the performance of players who will be given a trial in the majors. The best batter was Paul Wagner, purchased from San Francisco by the Pittsburgh Pirates. Wagner hit .401 in 174 games. Right on his heels was Paul Strahl, who cost the Athletics a "banishment sum," turned out to be a "bust" and was sent back. Last year he hit .400, but he was in only a few games.

Frank O'Neil, who will join the Chicago Cubs, traveled at a .375 clip for 153 games while with Salt Lake. O'Neil is an outfielder. Frank Brazil, once with the Athletics, was only 20 points behind O'Neil. Frank Brown, another former American leaguer, hit .342 in 133 games.

Kenneth, a middle infielder who is scheduled to join Cincinnati, hit .222, only four points better than the yellow-robin Agnew. Harry Woodson, who returns to the Boston Braves through the draft, hit .225. Leading his last year in the "big show" he hit .225.

Kenneth McCann, purchased from Portland by the Boston Red Sox last season, had a batting mark of .219. He once had a trial with the Philadelphia Athletics. Harry Plummer, who goes to the Boston Red Sox, is another promising youngster, who once won with the St. Louis Cardinals.

Jack Warren, given a trial by Detroit in the closing days of the 1925 season, hit .183 with Vernon, while Clyde Hook, who goes to the Chicago Cubs from the Los Angeles club, hit .211.

SCARLET FEVER PREVENTION
 (By Dr. Frederick Stricker)

Mild scarlet fever is prevalent in Oregon and attention is called to the fact that no matter how mild scarlet fever may be it is a dangerous communicable disease. These cases are frequently missed unless attention is called by the presence of typical scarlet fever in those with whom they have been in contact.

Prevention for scarlet fever has now progressed to the point where it is as well understood as for any other preventable disease. Of course, isolation and the elimination of contact is of primary importance in stopping out an epidemic, but the production of an active immunity can be produced by the injection of diluted toxin.

Not every one, especially adults, is susceptible to scarlet fever. Ninety per cent of the cases occur before the fifteenth year, and half of those between the ages of three to eight so that as we advance in years we become normally immune.

It is possible and highly desirable that we discriminate at an early age between those who are immune and those who are susceptible. The Dick test, which derives its name from its originator, who was also the discoverer of the scarlet fever germ, consists simply in injecting very diluted toxin into

the skin. The susceptible person will show a more or less marked area of reddening of the skin at the point of injection within 24 hours. Those who are immune show only a red spot where the skin was punctured. The reddening of the skin disappears in a short time.

A rational method for the prevention of scarlet fever has been developed. Susceptible persons can be immunized by injecting graduated doses of scarlet fever toxin. Scarlet fever toxin is not used in the treatment of scarlet fever patients and it should not be given to persons who already may be infected. Five doses are used for a prophylactic treatment. Five hundred, 1000, 2000, 4000 and 8000 skin test doses given at five to seven day intervals make a complete course of immunization. If an active immunity has been established the Dick test will be negative. It is thought that the artificial immunity will last throughout the life of the individual, but inasmuch as the procedure has only been in operation a few years, conclusive proof is lacking.

The treatment of scarlet fever consists in using scarlet fever antitoxin, which is now easily available. The dose of the antitoxin depends on the severity of the case. It is effective in shortening the course of the disease and preventing complications. There is, however, no evidence at present that the treatment of scarlet fever with antitoxin will shorten the minimum quarantine. The isolation of the patient should be continued until discharges from the ears,

TOKYO, (AP)—The national census disclosed that there are seventeen Imperial families in Japan with a total of sixty-five members. Of these thirty-four are Peirines and thirty-one Princes. These figures do not include four members of the Royal Family who were abroad.

The number of court events in the three Imperial palaces in Tokyo was placed at 1,725. These include 550 men and 1,175 women.
