Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast—Stewed prunes, cereal, thin cream, French toast, sirup, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Sardine toast stuffed apples salad, graham bread, milk, tea.

Dinner—Pork pot pie, scalloped tomatoes, prune whip, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

When the pot pie is put into the oven to brown the crust the tomatoes can be scalloped thereby saving fuel.

Children under ten years of age should not be allowed to eat the pot pie. A lamb chop can be broiled under the same flame that heats the oven for the pie and tomatoes.

Pork Pot Pie

One and one half pounds lean pork, 3 potatoes, 1 small onion, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 3/4 teaspoon pepper, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, water.

Cut meat in pieces not more than two inches square trimming off fat. Try out fat in kettle, add onion and meat and brown slightly. Pour over boiling water to barely cover meat and simmer until tender but not broken. Stir 1 tablespoonful of flour and 3 tablespoons of cold water to a smooth paste. Add salt and pepper to flour before adding water. Stir this paste into the meat and blend and bring to the boiling point. Put alternate layers of meat and potatoes paved and cut in thin slices into a deep baking dish. Pour over gravy. Mix and sift flour, salt and baking powder. Rub in butter and cut in water to make a soft dough. Roll lightly on a floured molding board, shaping to fit baking dish. Cut a slash through the center and over meat and gravy in baking dish. Bake 40 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve from baking dish.

Historian Says Real Cowboy Did Not Practice Bullfighting

TOPEKA, Kan. (AP)—Old time ranchers of southwest Kansas, preoccupied in rounding up and branding cattle, never practiced bullfighting or other alleged cowboy sports. This information is contained in an account of the spring roundup of 1882, written for the Kansas Historical collections by J. T. Botkin, former state secretary.

"There was not a man among our crowd who ever bulldozed a steer or performed any of the circus stunts palmed off on the public today," asserts Mr. Botkin.

"That perfectly beautiful but wholly mythical creature, the cowgirl, had not yet been invented. Imagine, if you can, a girl on the roundup or on the trail. Think of her sleeping out in the open and on the ground without any bedding, excepting a wet and mouldy blanket or two, and maybe having to keep warm. No privacy, no opportunity for a bath; no chance to use feminine cosmetics. It simply wasn't done. The cowgirl is a myth."

French Women Seek Vote By Petting And By Waiting

PARIS (By the Associated Press)—French suffragists, with a method as chic as French milliners, are putting new touches to the technique of equal suffrage campaigning.

Petting, not picketing, summarizes the policy of the feminists, although they see their long expected enfranchisement repeatedly postponed in the senate by the press of the financial difficulties of the country.

If, as they hope, French women are added to the 175,000,000 voting women of the world as soon as a budget is finally balanced and the franc well on its way to stabilization, they will have conducted the most tranquil suffrage campaign that the world has seen. This develops the Frenchman's reputation for highly explosive temperament and volatility.

"This is no war of the sexes," said Mme. Leon Brunschvicg, president of the French Union of the International Suffrage Alliance, to the Associated Press.

"To heckle, aggravate and irritate the lawmakers now, when they are desperately striving to save the country from bankruptcy would not only injure the cause of suffrage, but would injure France."

The activities of a major portion of the feminist movement are directed from the Paris study of Mme. Brunschvicg. She is one of the prominent social workers of France. Among her friends she counts many prominent politicians. She is the wife of a noted professor of philosophy at the Sorbonne, and the mother of three children.

Suffrage leaders until a short time ago believed that victory was within their grasp. It only remained for the senate to ratify a bill granting women equal suffrage.
