CHICAGO (AP)—Five years of progressive effort in the extension of America's export business will be summed up in reports of the fifth annual meeting here January 25 of the American Manufacturers' Foreign Credit Insurance Exchange, a cooperative organization of 1400 firms and corporations in thirty-four states.

These members have pooled their credit information on 250,000 foreign buyers of American products, the index to this vast amount of business information providing a basis upon which the exchange issues insurance policies upon exports of its members.

In the little membership of the army here, there is a veteran salvationist, Mrs. Hattie Stanley, who has never been out of its ranks since she joined with her mother 26 years ago.

She remembers when the army was formed here by Eugene Smith 28 years ago, and how the first meetings were held in the old South Methodist church. Here was the only wedding ever celebrated here by the Salvation Army commander, and it was a gala affair, with 500 followers of the organization in attendance.

But she is more interested in the present activities of the army than in its history.
