

Farm Pointers

Whole potatoes nearly always produce better yields in Oregon than cut potatoes, experiments at the Oregon station show. The reason is that the whole potatoes have more eyes and produce more sprouts, and therefore produce a better stand. Disease-free seed consisting of small whole potatoes weighing one to two and a half ounces produced better than cut seed of similar size. The sorting of small cuts and little knobby potatoes, however, out of a diseased lot of potatoes brought reduced yields. In the average field many small potatoes are small because of disease.

Grimm alfalfa has proved successful in the Willamette valley, says the experiment station. Where the soils are well drained and sweet as the sandy, "mellow" soils—the crop has done excellently with no special treatment other than inoculation and land plaster. In some of the heavier and sourer soil types where the drainage is good, liming sometimes makes the crop successful. Genuine Grimm has proved longer lived and more resistant to the rosette disease than any other.

Fat Shows Beef Quality
The quality of beef is determined by the color and the fat according to the Oregon state experiment station. A dense, clear, white fat is associated with the best meat. Interior meat usually has a light-colored or yellow fat. The best meat is that in which the fat is abundant and well distributed through the lean portion. The best meat when freshly cut has a bright cherry color. Beef showing this color comes from beef-bred cattle. Oregon meadows suffer more winter injury where the ground is either very dry or very wet, the experiment station has found. A moderate moisture content tends to prevent root injury and favors the activity of nitrifying bacteria and the liberation of other necessary plant foods. Hardy varieties such as Grimm alfalfa are less subject to winter injury.

The secretary, who will be a full time employee of the association, is to be hired and appointed by the executive committee. The convention came to a close last night with the annual banquet attended by 200 persons. The place of the convention next year will be fixed by the executive committee.

Lillian Rosine Mother To Movie Actresses

NEW YORK, (AP).—A woman who can play off-screen mother to actresses around the movie studios, and so it might be said of Lillian Rosine that she makes a profession of motherhood.

In place of the "Why, mother, why?" with which children often vex the explanatory abilities of mothers, Miss Rosine is asked such questions as "Do you think I'll photograph well?" and "Would you wear your hair away from your ears or over them?" and "Do you think this dress makes me look too fat?"

Miss Rosine answers them a hundred times a day, for she is, in reality, a full time employee of the motion picture department, "listed on the payroll of the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer" as "Matron."

Her position is unique in that it consists, among other things, of rolling up and generally preparing extra girls and stars for screen tests. It is her duty to see that the make-up of every woman appearing in the company's pictures is correct and she attends to the details on all costumes from the appearance point of view.

Before a scene is filmed, she mounts a platform and picks out the flaws in costume and make-up which the director and others might have overlooked.

But what she regards as her really important work is that of playing mother confessor and adviser to nearly all of the girls at the studios, from stars to extras. She advises, cajoles, encourages and upbraids and generally mothers those who need or come to her for guidance.

Pension Is Sought for Last of Carson's Band

DENVER, Col., (AP).—Colorado friends of Dick Rutledge, last survivor of Kit Carson's famous band of Indian scouts, who now lives in Denver, are trying to have Congress pass a special act granting him a pension so that he may pass his declining years in comfort.

The veteran also served the government in other ways, once under General Phil Sheridan, but was never enlisted regularly. For this reason, he is not eligible for a pension unless special legislation provides for him.

In appearance the eighty-year-old plainsman is almost the double of the late Buffalo Bill, his co-scout. Like Colonel Cody, Rutledge has flowing locks, sweeping mustache and goatee. He towers six feet and three and a half inches, greater in height by one and a half inches than Buffalo Bill.

A vivid memory of Rutledge in the time he and Carson, in the spring of 1868, were attacked by seventy Apaches in a lonely pass on Trinchera mountain, near the Colorado-New Mexico line. For forty-eight hours they stood off the band, killing nearly a dozen before escaping under cover of darkness.

With Sheridan, Rutledge took part in several pitched battles with Indians. Once they pursued a band of Comanches and rescued two white women that had been captured three years previously.

Rutledge was born in Buchanan county, Missouri, later moving with his parents to the country around Fort Leavenworth. There he grew up in the same community with Buffalo Bill, and the two became good friends. Rutledge learned to throw the spear, rifle and be expert marksman while going at full speed on ponies.

During all his adventures with Carson and Sheridan, Rutledge was wounded with but two minor scars.

PORTLAND, (Special).—The unusually mild weather in the Pacific Northwest has permitted continuance of much outdoor work in all districts and has been a great help in holding employment to a much higher level than has ordinarily been the case at this time of year, according to reports from 41 employment offices in various northwestern cities received at 41 headquarters here today.
