2 Face Liquor Charge

MIDFORD, Ore.---Misfortune has come doubly to E. B. Thompson, Crescent City, Cal., truck driver. He was in a local hospital suffering from a laceration on the head sustained when he fell in a faint on a sidewalk and today he is in jail facing charges of possessing and transporting liquor together with his alleged partner, James Horn, of Crescent City, who, in addition, is being held on a charge of selling moonshine while armed with a deadly weapon.

Horn was arrested last night by State Special Agent Talbot, on the Redwood highway, nine miles south of Grants Pass, where he had cached 25 gallons of moonshine which he offered to sell to the officer.

Thompson fainted from exhaustion here after having driven all night with the cartload of liquor from Crescent City. He was placed under arrest at the hospital.

evidenced by the movement of the Federal Council of Churches to recommend the support of the best types of plays. Women's clubs are helping. Our universities are developing dramatists.

"The Little Theater movement is very similar to the Guild. Certainly, from these sources will come intelligent producers and managers, who, unlike many of the present, will recognize and select real drama for our stage."

Pollock still would like to see his plan for the "Mother theater," in which no seat would sell for more than a dollar, carried out. He would present the best plays in the New York house and then send them on tour to similar theaters in other cities.

"This would rehabilitate the road show business, which has been ruined by the trash and rot fostered upon the cities by our producers," Pollock said. "It also would enable us to give short runs of the plays in each city and employ our actors by the year."

The playwright, whose "The Fool" is playing in twenty-nine countries and whose "The Enemy" also will be sent abroad, does not expect the "revolution" to be carried out suddenly, but he believes that at the end of five years America will be represented by an artistic theater, with real drama.
