INDIANS MAKE GOOD FARMERS

CHILCOCCO, Okla. (AP)—Indian aversion to agricultural work is based on lack of confidence, not laziness, concludes Clyde M. Blair, superintendent of the United States Indian school here.

The theory that Indians cannot be good farmers has been disproved, he adds, by the successful results obtained by students who have operated farm projects for the last three years.

"Not all Oklahoma Indians are the favor, I think that rises in comparison with automobiles and other luxuries afforded by leases on rich oil and mining properties," Mr. Blair says. "A majority of the youths who attend school here are from the poorer tribes, and most of the boy farmers are dependent upon their own resources for expense money."

"Nearly all of the students, however, have allotments of farm land. They are being taught farm management so they may know what to do with their own land after they leave school, and thus they may act as economic missionaries to their people."

Twenty-three farm projects, averaging 7 1/2 acres each, were conducted by Indian boys during the last year. Only four projects were operated the first year, and twelve the second.

The farms are leased by the boys on the share plan, each young farmer receiving one-fourth of the crop he raises. Horses, machinery and seeds are furnished by the school. Their work is conducted under the direction of practical farmers, but they are encouraged to take the initiative and make their own decisions.

All students at the school spend half a day in academic study and the other half in some vocational work. The boy farmers spend their half days on their farms. During the summer vacations they devote their entire time to farm work. They learn "neighboring" by exchanging work during the busy harvest seasons.

The student farmers are taught not only to share the soil, seed and harvest their crops, but also to market them. They are permitted to do their own bargaining, and because of their personal interest, shrewdly "dicker" for the best prices.

Each boy puts about one-half of his land to wheat, one-fourth to oats and one-fourth to corn.

"We have found in years past that the Indian lacks confidence in his own ability to step out and compete successfully with the white man," Mr. Blair continues. "This lack of confidence is due to a combination of causes—poverty, fear and timidity. He does not want to be humiliated, and for fear he will be sometime, dares not try. We hope and believe that through the boy farm project as now maintained here, he will obtain confidence in his ability to manage his farm at home."

Eleven Cherokee members of the Five Civilized Tribes are operating farm projects. Other tribes represented are the Sae and Fox, Choctaw, Mississippi Choctaw, Arapaho and Kaw.
