## Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Grapejuice with lemon, cereal, thin cream, creamed dried beef, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.  
Luncheon—Baked celery and cheese, bran bread, apple sauce, ginger bread, milk, tea.  
Dinner—Salted steak, broiled bananas, head lettuce with French dressing, creamed spinach, poor man's rice pudding, graham bread, milk, coffee.

Since no potatoes are served with the meat a simple rice pudding is suggested as dessert. The pudding is made without eggs and supplies the necessary starchy food for the diet.

**Baked Celery and Cheese.**  
Two cups sliced celery, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 cups milk, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup grated cheese, 1/2 teaspoon salt, paprika.

Cook celery in slightly salted boiling water until tender. Use as little water as possible and cook dry or drain. Melt butter, stir in flour and slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Cook until thick and smooth. Add cheese, salt and paprika and stir until cheese is melted and perfectly blended with the sauce. Stir in the yolks of the eggs beaten until thick and lemon-colored. Add celery and fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a well-buttered baking dish and bake 30 minutes in a moderately hot oven. Serve at once. (Copyright, 1926, N.E.A.
