MOSCOW MAN FOUND DEAD
 MOSCOW, Idaho — D. H. Suddreth, age 45, well known resident, was found dead at his home, 195 North Ashbury street. Death apparently was due to heart failure or apoplexy.

Mr. Suddreth was employed as night watchman at the University of Idaho and died during the day, usually getting up about 2 o'clock. Mrs. Suddreth was absent from the home for several hours, and on returning late found him in a sitting posture on the edge of the bed, partly dressed. Physicians were called and said that he had been dead several hours.

Mr. Suddreth had been a resident of Moscow many years. He is survived by his widow, a daughter, his aged parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas T. Suddreth; three brothers, John A. Suddreth, L. W. Suddreth and Virgil Suddreth, and a sister, Mrs. Pauline Keith, Moscow.
